

A2-B1 Worksheet: The UFO Files - 14 May 2026

Article

On 8 May 2026, the US government released a new group of UFO files. UFO means an object in the sky that people cannot identify. The files include videos, photos and reports about strange lights and objects. Some stories are old, and some are from recent years.

Many people were excited because the files were secret before. However, the files do not prove that aliens visited Earth. In many cases, experts still do not know what people saw. The objects may be drones, aircraft, weather balloons or camera problems.

The release gives the public a chance to read the information and ask questions. More files may come later. For now, the main lesson is simple: strange things in the sky need careful study, not quick answers.
